### Goal #3 – Good Health & Well-Being

Why Is This Important? Before COVID, progress was made in many health areas, but needed acceleration. Since COVID, it is noted that healthcare disruptions could reverse decades of improvements. In fact, hundreds of thousands of additional under-5 deaths may be expected this year.

Worldwide statistics: Less than half of the global population is covered by essential health services.

#### What Can I Do About it?

Locally, Zontians can investigate the status of health care (supply, cost, and accessibility) in their own counties and states, then follow legislation that could improve the situation, and educate legislators about the solutions. Specifically, it worth learning more about the health care disparities experienced by racial and ethnic minority populations, especially since the pandemic.

### Treasurer's Report

The club continues to ask for donations from members, who have not donated, and others due to the COVID-19 restrictions that prevented the Club from conducting its major fundraiser in October. A total of \$2,953.61 was received thus far.

Fund Distribution: As funds become available: Children of Incarcerated Parents Program and The Family Partnership will receive \$300 each. The remainder of the service funds will be sent as required in 2021.

The following amounts were allocated: YWPA - \$500; Klausman - \$500; Art in the Park - \$200;

Helen Smith Scholarship - \$500; Returning Woman Scholarship - \$500. Additionally, a check will be sent to Heartly House in January once the amount is decided.

### Jennifer Dougherty speaks at December meeting

Jennifer provided insight on her political and business career and coping with COVID. Jennifer was the first female mayor in the City of Frederick, serving one term. She remains involved and active in politics still.



As owner of Magoo's Pub and Eatery in Frederick City, she spoke about the challenges she faced during COVID restrictions, such as protecting her clients and employees. She said it was a struggle but was incredibly grateful for the support the community extended, especially her "regulars," so the restaurant could expand carry-out meals and remain open once they could do so. Using heaters outside at tables helped to draw customers to the restaurant.

She praised the local elected officials, who were faced with making decision as to business operations within the County and City. Everyone was facing unknown challenges and adjusting almost daily.

Applications for the YWPA Awards are being accepted through March 28, 2021.

Women, aged 16-19 on April 1<sup>st</sup> each year, studying at a secondary school, college, or university in a Zonta district/region, or who are studying elsewhere but are citizens of a Zonta country are eligible to apply. The Zonta Club of Frederick awards \$500 annually to the selected applicant. There are 32 District awards of US\$1,500 each and 10 International awards of US\$5,000 each.
